

Road Study Begins

The Board of Supervisors recently approved a comprehensive road management plan study. This plan will help the Township focus on preservation of our roads as the first priority instead of total reconstruction. A complete evaluation of the Township road system was performed by the Township's engineer, zoning officer, and roadmaster. From this evaluation, a report is being written that will grade each road according to their condition. This will help to determine an acceptable yearly budget amount for road preservation.

Township Receives Two Awards for Burnt House Road Bridge

At the May 20, 2013 Board of Supervisors' meeting, Chad Clancy from Modjeski & Masters presented the Board with two award plaques for the Burnt House Road humpback bridge; one for Outstanding New Short Span Bridge and one for Outstanding CSS Bridge Design. Mr. Clancy noted that PennDOT, and not the taxpayer, paid for the construction of the bridge. The awards are proudly displayed in the Township Municipal Building main hallway.



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New Emergency Services Provider

As of April 1st of this year, WellSpan Health EMS moved one of their advanced life support (ALS) units out of Gettysburg Hospital to the Bendersville Fire Company in Adams County. This unit is known as Adams County Medic 53, and will be providing advanced life support to the southern part of our Township. This is great news for our Township because it signifies a shorter response time for ALS service to our residents on the south side.

Adams County Medic 53 joins our other wonderful emergency providers in our Township, Yellow

Breeches EMS who provide basic life support (BLS) to the southern portion of the Township and Cumberland Goodwill EMS who provide both ALS and BLS to the northern portion of the Township.

So what is the difference between BLS and ALS units? The easiest answer is that BLS units will transport the patient to the hospital while providing basic life support while the ALS unit, which includes paramedics, will bring the hospital to the patient in order to stabilize the patient before transporting to the hospital.

Preparing for the 2014 Budget

Every year around mid-summertime, Dickinson Township starts collecting information to prepare the next year's budget. Before any numbers are entered into spreadsheets, staff compiles information from various sources to try and allocate funds properly so residents can receive the best services for the lowest cost without sacrificing quality. This juggling act is stressful, but necessary in order to know where

funds are being allocated. Residents are encouraged to participate in budget discussions and attend budget meetings. Meetings dates have to be approved by the Board of Supervisors and properly advertised. Budget meetings typically occur in October. Our website will be updated with actual dates and times as soon as they have been determined. We welcome your input, comments and questions.

Township Welcomes New Supervisor

Supervisor elect, Allyn Perkins, resigned from the Board of Supervisors effective April 30, 2013 due to a home purchase outside the township boundaries. Due to this move, he no longer met the residency requirements and, therefore, resigned. Dr. Perkins' resignation created a vacancy on the Board of Supervisors which had to be filled within 30 days. On Wednesday,



May 22, 2013, J.R. Barrett was appointed by the Board of Supervisors to fulfill the remainder of Dr. Perkins' term, which will end on December 31, 2013. Mr. Barrett won the Republican primary and will be on the November general election ballot. We welcome Interim Supervisor Barrett and wish him the best in his appointment.

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Your Trash Questions Answered

Keeping up with new regulations, recycling practices and hauler contracts can overwhelm anyone trying to be a good citizen and properly dispose of waste. We've answered the most common questions for you below.

REGULAR TRASH

Dickinson Township is in their third year of a three-year contract with Advanced Disposal. Residents have two options for trash; toter cart service or the tag-a-bag option. Toter carts are approximately 90 gallons and cost \$44.31 per quarter which is directly billed to the resident. Tag-a-bag is a bag-by-bag option for those who might have minimal trash disposal needs. This option allows the user to place a special sticker on each bag of trash before placing it at the curb for pick up. At the beginning of the contract year, residents were sent 12 tags and billed \$36.36 yearly. Additional tags may be purchased on an as-needed basis for \$3.03 per tag. Residents can contact the company at 1-800-223-3888 or at 717-423-5917 to set up their preferred service, order more tags or get questions answered about their bill.

Trash & Recycling Tips

Q: Do I have to separate my recyclable items?

A: No. Dickinson Township utilizes single stream recycling. This means items do not have to be separated by glass, plastic or cans. Advanced Disposal asks that residents place paper into a paper bag and keep cardboard into 3' x 3' tied bundles. Even glossy magazines and junk mail can be recycled.

Q: How can I dispose of larger items, such as a couch?

A: Our trash contract allows residents to place one bulk item curbside every week. If the item is not something that can easily be lifted by one person, please contact Advanced Disposal at 1-800-223-3888 so they can plan accordingly.

Q: Where can I get a recycle bin?

A: Contact Advanced Disposal at 1-800-223-3888. They can leave a bin curbside or residents can get a free bin at the Township building from 7am until 3:30pm, Monday through Friday.



BULK ITEMS

Residents may place one bulk item out with their trash each week. This includes items such as a couch, mattress, desk, table or recliner. Advanced Disposal asks that you call ahead to let them know you have a bulk item for pick up. This allows them to send more than one person on the route if necessary.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS

Items such as used motor oil oil-based paint, pesticides and pool chemicals can be disposed of through the Cumberland County Household Hazardous Waste Program. Residents can call 1-877-697-4123 or visit www.ccpacshhw.net to order a collection kit for \$20.00. The kit will be shipped directly to the resident and can hold up to 100 pounds of hazardous materials.

Directions and a list of acceptable and unacceptable items is included in the kit. Collections occur at least monthly. You will be notified of the scheduled collection day and a contractor will pick up the materials for proper disposal. More information, including a video of how to use the collection kit is available at www.ccpacshhw.net. Tires, anti-freeze, batteries and motor oil can be disposed of at most automobile part stores. Please contact the business to see if they will dispose of your items.

ELECTRONICS RECYCLING

Computers and other electronic equipment can be recycled at local big-box stores such as Best Buy or Staples. The Computer Barn at 1460 Neville Road in Carlisle also accepts most electronic items. They can be reached at 717-258-9663 or through their website at www.thecomputerbarn.com. Televisions may be recycled at Zero Export Recyclers at 106 West Lauman Street in Mt. Holly Springs. You can contact them at 717-254-1969 or visit their website at www.zeroexport.net for more information.

Planting is currently scheduled for September 28th but will ultimately depend on tree availability from the vendor. The Township needs volunteers to help with a Saturday planting event. "Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, church groups, school clubs, individuals and anyone interested in helping beautify the local area can participate." Participants will be contacted via their preferred method with more details as the planting date approaches.

With the acceptance of the Tree Vitalize grant, the Parks & Recreation Committee has been approved to pursue another grant to help develop the walking path along Lindenwood Park. In mid-May, committee members submitted their Land Partnerships Grant application to Cumberland County. Grant awards are expected mid-summer. If awarded the Land Partnerships Grant, construction on a 1.23 mile walking path will begin in early October of 2013. 

Preparing for a Disaster

When we think of summer time, we think of long sunny days, warm weather, outdoor activities and cook-outs. But, as we have already experienced, this is also the time for stormy weather. Severe weather such as high winds, torrential rains, tornadoes, and flooding can occur at any time with very little or no warning. It can force you to evacuate your neighborhood or confine you to your home. Knowing what to do in an emergency and being prepared is your best defense. Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) offers great information on their website, www.ReadyPa.org, on how to be prepared for a disaster. **They advocate three easy steps to be prepared for a disaster: be informed, be prepared, be involved.**

BE INFORMED

Be informed about the types of emergencies that can occur in your area and what specific actions you can take. ReadyPa.org has a link to 10 potential emergencies in Pennsylvania, facts about each type of emergency, and ad-

vice on how to deal with each situation.

BE PREPARED

PEMA recommends that, in the event of an emergency, we all should be able to survive on our own for a minimum of three days. This means being able to provide our own shelter, food, water, first-aid, sanitation and other basic needs. While local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, they cannot always reach everyone right away. Making emergency plans for you and your family at home, at work, or in school, is important. Have a communication and evacuation plan ready and practice it. Also, prepare an emergency kit for your home, car, and work. You can find checklists on how to create plans and put together emergency kits on PEMA's website, ReadyPa.org.

BE INVOLVED

Working with neighbors can save lives and property. Meet with your neighbors to plan how the neighborhood could work together after a disaster until help arrives. If you're a member of a neighborhood organization, such as a home association or crime watch group, introduce disaster preparedness as a new activity. Know your neighbors' special skills (e.g., medical, technical). Consider how you could help neighbors who have special needs, such as disabled and elderly persons.

Remember, Dickinson Township has a notification system called *NIXLE*. This system provides a quick, efficient, and secure way to get township-level information out to subscribed members by e-mail or cell phone. Our system will be used to notify residents of any emergencies at Township level, road closures, community events, and meeting cancellations. Cumberland County Department of Public Safety subscribes to *South Central Alert System*. The *South Central Alert System* will be used at county level by emergency managers to alert citizens of urgent, critical situations such as evacuation notices and instructions, shelter in place notifications, or boil water advisories. Living with Black Bears

Dickinson Township has been called home to the black bear since before the first settlers were here in the 1700s. Even though black bears typically reside in the mountainous regions of Dickinson Township, they can also be found in residential areas. Bears are usually dormant in winter and have an active mating season from early June to mid-July. Many of our residents enjoy nature hikes and cookouts at that time. Following a few commonsense rules can prevent a disastrous situation for both humans and bears.

ELIMINATE TEMPTATION

Black bears will consume almost anything. They will eat livestock feed, pet foods, human food and garbage. Bird feeders and hummingbird feeders are a treat for them. They can sometimes be spotted ravaging corn fields and beehives. Keep trash containers closed and locked if possible. Don't put garbage out until pick up day. Remember to clean your trash receptacles regularly with soap and bleach to eliminate odors. Don't throw table scraps outside for animals to eat, or add fruit or vegetable waste to your compost pile. Clean your barbeque



grill regularly. If you feed your pets outdoors, bring in their food bowls at night. Do not feed wildlife.

KEEP YOU DISTANCE

If a bear shows up, stay calm. Shout at it from a distance like you would an unwanted dog. Bears have poor eyesight, so if you don't make noise, they might not know you are there. If you hear your dog barking or your cat clawing at the door, cautiously try to determine why by turning on outside lights and making noise. Males are more aggressive during the mating season, especially to each other, and sows are very protective of cubs. Bears will generally stay away from chained or penned up dogs. However, bears will attack and possibly kill a free roaming dog if confronted. Remember to keep your dog leashed when you hike. If you suspect you are being visited by a bear, try to remove the food source for about a month.

Bears can be on the move at anytime, but are most active at night or early morning. Watch for claw marks on smooth barked trees as well as sizeable droppings containing partially digested corn, berries and animal remains. Watch for distinctive bear tracks. Bears have five toes; the front foot is shorter than the rear, with the rear foot resembling a human foot. Listen for bear sounds such as growls, woofing, and jaw-popping. Please remember, bears use trails just like people do!



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REPTILIAN LIFE

We are very fortunate to enjoy a variety of reptilian wildlife in Dickinson Township. During the warmer months, residents can see lizards, skinks and snakes at any given time. If you are hiking rocky outcrops or near open woodland, you can look for the Northern Fence Lizard. They are a small lizard that can readily be identified by the gray or brown body and turquoise to blue belly. The scales on the back are keeled and pointed. They generally reside in trees where they like to hunt beetles, rest, and find safety when frightened. Residents might also see three different kinds of skinks. These are the Five-Lined Skink, the Broadhead Skink, and the Northern Coal Skink. Skinks can be recognized as a smooth, shiny, almost slippery lizard. They have a cylindrical



cal body and tail with smooth scales. All lizards located in Central PA are insectivores, and non-venomous. Residents can also come into contact with snakes in the township. Most snakes that show up in the average backyard, shed or house are non-venomous, harmless and beneficial to man. All are carnivorous. There are 18 non-venomous snakes species located in Central Pennsylvania. There are 2 venomous snakes in our area; the Northern Copperhead and Timber Rattlesnake. All venomous snakes possess a pit on each side of the head between the eye and nostril, a vertically elliptical eye pupil resembling that of a cat, and a single row of scales on the underside of the tail. All snakes are non-aggressive and prefer to avoid confrontation. Residents should watch where they are putting their hands and feet when climbing logs or rocks. If a snake bite should occur, stay calm but do not wait to see if symptoms develop. Seek immediate medical attention!
